A Message from Pastor Allman by Pastor David Allman

Endings and beginnings. People often like new beginnings and regret endings. The circumstances usually mean that we must deal with both at the same time. Even Christians who say they are not afraid to end their mortal life and begin their eternal life, will hasten to add that they are not yet ready for that to happen.

Each year the end of November marks the end of the Church calendar and the beginning of December marks the beginning of the new Church year. Worship in the Church keeps a different calendar than does business in the Church. As you read this we are likely already into the Season of Advent, while those using the secular calendar are already into the season of Christmas.

It becomes confusing, especially when Christmas decorations were selling in the stores before Halloween. It is also confusing because most congregations, ours included, have put up Christmas decorations, and we are not yet singing Christmas carols -- we sing Advent hymns. For Christians Christmas does not technically begin until the birth of the Christ child - that is, Christmas Day. So logically, if we want to keep Christ in Christmas, then we should not sing about Christ's birth during Advent -before he has been born.

Now some of you will be thinking, "But, Christ was born 2,017 years ago, so it is okay to sing about his birth any time." And, you would be right, and yet in the new Church year that birth has not happened, even though in the secular calendar the birth has already happened. I have just spent a lot of words to get you to think about how we live in the "already and not yet."

The November gospel readings have focused on the Second coming of Jesus -- the Parousia. Many consider this to mean that this world comes to an end. The last Sunday of November is Christ the King -- which many see as the final Judgement of the Nations. In 1st Advent's gospel Jesus is encouraging us to look forward to his return when"...the will sun be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken" (Mark 13:24).

When one is reading gospel words about the end of the world, it proves difficult to match that Sunday with a heartfelt rendition of "Silent Night," which brings me back full circle to how difficult it is for us to deal with endings and beginnings. People often like new beginnings and regret endings. We would rather sing about the birth of the Savior than think about the consequences of his second coming. We cannot have one without the other.

During Advent we live in the "already and not yet." We prepare for the birth of the Savior and the Parousia at the same time. We would like to cuddle the baby wrapped in swaddling clothes while at the same time hope the adult Jesus does not return in our lifetime. The circumstances insist that we cannot have one without the other.

I invite you to embrace the season of Advent for what it is -the "already and not yet." Lean into the seemingly paradoxical circumstances of the newborn baby and judge of the nations; prince of peace and the bringer of the righteous verdict; the wonderful counselor and the one who pronounces sentence on sinners; as well as other character traits of our Savior and Lord.





In a daily devotional from November 13th, Greg Laurie asked the question, "What Makes a Disciple?" In the Great Commission, Matthew 28:19-20 (NLT), Jesus instructed us to "...go and make disciples of all the nations;" and, to "Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you." In John 8:31 (NLT) Jesus tells us, "You are truly my disciples if you remain faithful to my teachings."



Greg Laurie contrasts disciples with students. The student is the one who is required to go to school and is expected to learn, even when they do not want to be there. The disciple is the one who is excited about learning from the teacher, and is excited to apply to their life all they have learned from the teacher.


Greg Laurie writes, "In the Bible, the idea of a disciple is someone who listens to a person who has full knowledge. That listener is drinking in every word, marking every inflection of the voice, absorbing every detail. They cannot get enough. It is <u>attention</u> with <u>intention</u>" (emphasis added).



How would you describe yourself in regard to Jesus and the Church? Are you a disciple -- excited to come to church, learn as much as you can about Jesus, and apply that learning to your life; or, do you feel like a student, who attends church because it feels like a duty, maybe you will learn something if the pastor is not too boring, and doubtful that church is relevant to real life in this 21st century?




DECEMBER EVANGELISM

ARE WE A CRUISE SHIP OR A FISHING VESSEL?

One Tuesday morning in our staff meeting, Father Kevin Warner, asked the group of this question. "Are we a cruise ship or a fishing vessel?" After a very brief discussion we moved on to the task of the day. I'm not sure if the others in this meeting have given any more thought to this question, but I have thought about it many, many times over the last several weeks. Now I am asking you this question. Is Redeemer Lutheran Church a cruise ship or a fishing vessel? Are we just sitting in the pews soaking up the "son" and enjoying spending time with our family and friends while forgetting everything and everyone around us? Are we "cruising" through our Christian life? Or are we a fishing vessel? Are we out there on the ocean which is full of fish just waiting to be caught? Do you have your pole in the water? Is your net ready to haul your catch on board? Are we reluctant to fish for people, whether from fear, selfishness, weariness, or skepticism that it will actually work? We have all heard and read the story of Peter and Jesus and their fishing trip. If your faith for "fishing" is not as strong as you want it to be, this story has some encouragements that might help:





Jesus calls us in our weakness. Jesus determined that the best time to call Peter as an evangelist was when he was at his weakest. Peter's nets were empty, he was probably hungry and he was definitely tired from working all night and having nothing to show for it. He was probably in a pretty bad mood also. Why was this the best time? Peter needed his pride, unbelief, and weakness exposed. He needed to see himself as someone who, apart from Jesus, could do nothing (John 15:5). He needed to know who rules the fish and who fills the nets. Then he would be able to fish in faith.

It really doesn't take great faith to drop the nets. Even though Peter was pretty sure that nothing was going to come from this fishing trip, he still responded, "at your word I will let down the nets" (Luke 5:5). Peter was willing to do it for Jesus's sake.

Jesus provides the fish. When Peter threw his nets overboard, Jesus filled them. It was a powerful, ministry-shaping moment. Jesus commands fish and will fill our nets according to his plan. Our job as evangelists is to listen to Jesus and prayerfully, faithfully, drop the nets.

Signs and symptoms OF BREAST CANCER

- A lump in the breast the most common first sign.
- A lump in the armpit (axilla) Sometimes small, hard lumps in the armpit.
- Changes in breast shape or size
- Skin changes skin of the breast may become dimpled or puckered.
- Nipple changes Normal nipples that suddenly become inverted

Sometimes there are no symptoms of breast cancer in the earliest stages. However, talk to your doctor as soon as possible if you notice anything unusual. Don't be embarrassed or think it is going to go away. Have it checked! This applies to both men and women.


