### A Message from Pastor Allman by Pastor David Allman

It seems unrealistic that the year 2018 has come. I remember being in high school and reading far-fetched novel entitled 1984, published in 1949 by English author George Orwell. I wonder if 1984 seemed so very far away during 1949. I confess that in the 1970's it made me feel a little nervous. Then 1984 did not happen, although in the "Back to the Future" movies, Marty McFly and Doc Brown traveled from 1985 into the future year 2015 to witness flying cars and hover boards and all kinds of "wonders." Obviously 2015 has come and gone with no flying cars and a somewhat attempt at making skateboards "hover." In fact, I think I read something about hover board motors catching on fire and/or exploding.

In between then and now we also had the Y2K scare where computers would not be able to handle the year 2000 and all kinds of weapons of mass destruction would be unleashed. I remember New Year's Eve 1999 was supposed to be the party to end all parties, in response to the end of the world coming 1/1/2000. I remember people buying the Y2K fix for their computers, which I did not, thinking I would not need my computer when the world ended, and nothing happened - either to the world or my computer. I admit that I was a little disappointed.

We all grew up in what is called the "modern world" and now we are said to be living in the "postmodern world." I think my Smart Phone is smarter than I am. I know my daughter and son are both smarter than I am. I saw a commercial the other day in which a young boy of about 10-years-old was doing amazing things with an electronic tablet. An adult asked what he was doing on his computer and he asked, "What's a computer?"

It feels to me like time and advances in science and technology move at a rate to which I cannot keep up. Four months after I "pre-ordered" my Galaxy S8 a salesman told Candy and I that it was already obsolete because the iPhone X and the Google Pixel 2 were coming out for Christmas. While technology may become quickly obsolete, "post-moderns" and consider the institutional church to be obsolete, the Word of God does not become obsolete.

In April I will have been the Pastor here at Redeemer for five years. It seems like the time has passed too quickly. In other ways we-- and I mean the whole congregation --have made significant advances. When I accepted the Call (2013) I was told by Council leaders that Redeemer's average attendance was around 150. For 2016 (2017 has not yet ended as of writing) our this average attendance was 206. It appears that the 2017 average may be a little higher. That is directly attributed to your willingness to invite others to "come and see." Please continue to invite others to "come and see" what is happening here at Redeemer.

The space for this article is too small to list all of the new ministries and new ministers involved and to thank the people who have been guiding this congregation into God's preferred future for Redeemer. The first sermon I preached here after Pastor Stiller's retirement was based on Jeremiah 29:11, "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" (NIV). Those words still ring true for Redeemer; and I believe God will continue to bless us while we hold true to God's Word.

Pedro Manuel Suarez, on January 20th and has agreed to speak to us, as one of his supporters, on Sunday, January 21st. ## JANUARY STEWARDSHIP

Walter Brueggemann is an American Protestant Old Testament scholar and theologian who is widely considered one of the most influential Old Testament scholars of the last several decades. Plus he is 84-years-old so he is of the same generation as many of you who are reading this article. In other words, he understands what it means to be part of what has come to be called "The Greatest Generation."

In an article titled, "The Liturgy of Abundance, the Myth of Scarcity" he writes that wealth, or the acquisition of wealth, becomes a kind of narcotic for we Americans. As such, we tend to not even notice our own prosperity. He writes, "The great contradiction is that we have more and more money and less and less generosity..."

American consumerism is never more obvious than during the Christmas season. Consumerism is more than simple marketing. It creates a love affair with "more" and the myth that there can never be enough. A prime example is the latest iPhone to hit the market a couple of weeks before Christmas. I do not believe that anyone could justify this gadget as a "need," yet people were lined up early to spend nearly \$1000.00 on something that will likely be considered obsolete in a few months.

Brueggemann teaches that God's Word in Genesis 1 starts out with a liturgy of abundance. God gives us everything we <u>need</u> and declares it to be good, good, good, good and very good. God tells creation to be fruitful and multiple. God tells Abraham and Sarah to be a blessing, to bless the people of all nations. The following chapters of Genesis are filled with God's goodness and generosity. It is not until we reach the end of Genesis, where we read about the Pharaoh in

Egypt, and we first encounter an attitude of scarcity -- the idea that there will not be enough -- unless we grab and hoard and keep for ourselves.

The lesson we learn from Pharaoh is to beware of feeling that we never have enough; that we have to have more and more, because this insatiable desire will destroy us -- which it did to Pharaoh. God's Word teaches us abundance. Human nature teaches us scarcity. Life consists of a continuing inner struggle deciding which to believe. One problem is that most Christians read/hear the Word of God once a week, while we are exposed to advertisements - as many as 5000 - every day.

Jesus said, "No one can serve two masters... You cannot serve God and wealth" (Matthew 6:24). Jesus tells us that we can change the world. Jesus left ordinary people amazed and grateful; he left wealthy and powerful people angry and upset. Consumerism wants us to believe that the world consists of buying and selling. Jesus presents a world infused with abundance and generosity.

The challenge Jesus brings to Christians is to recognize God's abundance, especially within our own lives, and prayerfully consider, with God, to discern how to live the liturgy of abundance and dispense with the myth of scarcity.

### **BUSTING HOSPICE MYTHS**

### From Parish Nurse Team

### 1. Hospice is a place.

Hospice is a philosophy of care and can be received wherever the patient and their loved ones prefer. This includes at home, in a senior living facility, or in-patient in a hospice facility if needed.

### 2. If you choose hospice, you can't keep seeing your primary care physician.

If preferred, the patient's current primary care physician can remain their doctor while on hospice care.

### 3. Hospice is only for cancer patients.

Hospice is available for any patient coping with the end stage of any chronic disease, including kidney failure, heart and pulmonary disease, Alzheimer's, and virtually any other life-limiting condition.

### 4. Hospice hastens death.

Hospice care does not speed up death. In fact, those who employ hospice care may live longer than those who choose not to use hospice services. Hospice care is focused on making the patient as comfortable as possible.

### 5. Hospice is only used in the very last weeks of life.

Hospice care can begin when the patient's physician gives a prognosis of six months or less if the disease follows the expected course. Hospice often provides such comfort and support that many outlive their expected prognosis. If the patient lives longer than 6 months, hospice care can continue as long as the patient meets criteria.

### 6. Hospice is too expensive.

Hospice care is covered under the Medicare hospice benefit, Medicaid and most private insurance plans. Patients are not denied hospice care regardless of ability to pay.

### 7. A doctor has to make a referral for hospice care.

Anyone, including a family member, a caregiver, or the patient themselves, can make a referral for hospice care. It only takes a phone call for care and services to be arranged.

### 8. The patient can never return to regular medical treatment once on hospice.

If the patient shows improvement in condition or wishes to return to curative treatment, they can be discharged from hospice at any time. They can later return to hospice care.

### 9. Hospice care ends when the patient dies.

Bereavement services are offered for family members for a minimum of one year.

### 10. Hospice patients must sign a Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) order.

A signed DNR is not required to receive hospice care.




## Help needed to take down Christmas decorations
