A Message from Pastor Allman by Pastor David Allman

The word "Spirit" is used in the Bible 566 times in the New Living Translation. That many times leads me to believe that God considers the Holy Spirit and our Spirit to be very significant. From Genesis 1:2 when God's Spirit hovered over the waters of Creation to Revelation 22:17 when God's Spirit invites everyone who is thirsty to come and drink from the waters of eternal life.

In January I returned to Seminary. I have enrolled in a continuing education class titled "Spiritual Direction." I firmly believe that we can never stop learning and growing. As I write this I am preparing to leave for a week of onsite learning and also reviewing the books I will need to read and papers I will need to write. Part of me wonders, "What was I thinking?" and part of me

is very excited about something that takes me outside of my comfort zone.

Most Lutherans, I think, shy away from talking about the Holy Spirit and our own spirituality. Many who take the Alpha series do not come for the "Holy Spirit" days. I think talking about the Spirit makes us uncomfortable. I know it can make me feel uncomfortable sometimes. Yet we recently loved hearing the story of how Gabriel told Mary that the child born within her would be conceived by God's Holy Spirit. We recently were in awe of the story of Jesus' baptism when the Holy Spirit descended on Jesus like a dove. After Jesus' baptism we confirm that Jesus was led by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness for 40 days. And, perhaps a little uncomfortable when John the

Baptist tells us that Jesus comes to baptize us with the Holy Spirit and with fire. We also take delight in hearing how the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples like tongues of fire on the day of Pentecost.

In our doctrines and teachings we baptize children in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We teach that the child is forever more marked by the sign of the cross and sealed with the Holy Spirit; that the Holy Spirit lives in that person forever; and, that through the Holy Spirit we are each (every one of us) given spiritual gifts for building up the body of Christ -- that is, to help each other.

God's Holy Spirit and our Spirit are the ways in which we communicate with God and God communicates with us. When

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you pray do you take the time to "be still" as the Bible states and listen for God to answer? Or, do you check off your prayer list and rush on to the rest of your to-do list? Would you go to the doctor and check off all of your ailments and immediately rush out the door without allowing the doctor to respond? I doubt it. Let me encourage you to think more about your Spirit and God's Holy Spirit, just as I will be in the months ahead.

FEBRUARY STEWARDSHIP

I recently enrolled in a class at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. One of the books we are reading is titled "Celebration of Discipline" by Richard J. Foster. Two pages I recently read moved me to use his words for this article. Here are the words from Foster on the discipline of Simplicity, pages 80, 81.

"Simplicity begins in inward focus and unity. It means to live out of what Thomas Kelly calls "The Divine Center." Kierkegaard captured the nucleus of Christian simplicity well in the profound title of his book, Purity of Heart Is to Will One Thing.

Experiencing the inward reality liberates us outwardly. Speech becomes truthful and honest. The lust for status and position is gone because we no longer need status and position. We cease from showy extravagance not on the grounds of being unable to afford it, but on the grounds of principle. Our goods become available to others. We join the experience that Richard E. Byrd, after months alone in the barren Arctic, recorded in his journal, 'I am learning...that a man can live profoundly without masses of things.'

Contemporary culture lacks both the inward reality and the outward life-style of simplicity. We must live in the modern world, and we are affected by its fractured and fragmented state. We are trapped in a maze of competing attachments. One moment we make decisions on the basis of sound reason and the next moment out of fear of what others will think of us. We have no unity or focus around which our lives are oriented.

Because we lack a Divine Center our need for security has led us into an insane attachment to things. We really must understand that the lust for affluence in contemporary society is psychotic. It is psychotic because it has completely lost touch with reality. We crave things we neither need nor enjoy. 'We buy things we do not want to impress people we do not like.' Where planned obsolescence leaves off, psychological obsolescence takes over. We are made to feel ashamed to wear clothes or drive cars until they are worn out. The mass media have convinced us that to be out of step with fashion is to be out of step with reality. It is time we awaken to the fact that conformity to a sick society is to be sick. Until we see how unbalanced our culture has become at this point, we will not be able to deal with the mammon spirit within ourselves nor will we desire Christian simplicity. This psychosis permeates even our mythology. The modern hero is the poor boy who purposefully becomes rich rather than the rich boy who voluntarily becomes poor.

We should take exception to the modern psychosis that defines people by how much they can produce or what they earn. We should experiment with bold new alternatives to the present death-giving system. The Spiritual Discipline of simplicity is not a lost dream, but a recurrent vision throughout history. It can be recaptured today. It must be."

To which, all I can say at this moment is, "Wow!"

What You Need to Know ABOUT COLON CANCER



Your colon is the lower end of your digestive system



Colon cancer affects men and women equally



On average, your risk is about 1 in 20



90% of new cases occur in people 50 or older



Colon cancer is on the rise in those under 50.

RISK FACTORS

People in the following categories are at greater risk of developing the disease:

- Individuals with a personal and/or family history of polyps or cancer
- People over age 50
- · Those with ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease
- Individuals with the genetic conditions Hereditary Nonpolyposis Colon Cancer (HNPCC) or Familial Adenomatous Polyposis (FAP)
- Jews of Eastern European descent and certain ethnic groups including African Americans, Native Americans, Alaskan Natives and Latinos

SYMPTOMS


- · Change in bowel habits
- · Rectal bleeding or blood in your stool
- · Persistent abdominal discomfort
- · Nausea or vomiting
- · Unexplained weight loss
- · Chronic fatigue

Oftentimes, symptoms do not appear in early stages of the disease. Do not wait for symptoms before talking to your doctor.

What You Can Do

- Get screened at age 50, or at 45 if you're African American. Get screened earlier if you're high risk
- · Maintain a healthy weight
- Adopt a physically active lifestyle
- · Eat a healthy diet
- · Don't use tobacco products
- · Limit alcohol intake


