## A message from Pastor Allman by David Allman

On the secular calendar Easter lasts for one (1) day. On the Church calendar Easter is a season that lasts fifty (50) days. In the secular world people celebrate a bunny with the sharing of candy and hard boiled eggs. In the Church we celebrate the Risen Savior with the good news of salvation and eternal life. In the secular world most people end their Easter day miserable with a stomach ache. In the Church Easter does not really end because every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection. These thoughts cause me to wonder why the Church is thought to be out of touch with reality and not relevant to society?

On Facebook one day in March I saw an image with this message: *“Trying to make the Gospel relevant is like trying to make water wet.”* To me this means

that it is not our job to make the Gospel relevant, the Gospel is already relevant. Our job is to help others understand why the message of the secular world is the illusion; and, the power of the Resurrection is the truth that will set people free from that illusion.

Helping others understand this Truth requires that we first understand this ourselves. How many of us are fully committed to the Kingdom of God? How many of us still hold on to the illusion that money, possessions and personal pleasure will bring us fulfillment? In the opening chapters of the book *“New Seeds of Contemplation”* Thomas Merton talks about what he calls the *“false self”* and the *“true self.”*

For Merton the *“true self”* can only be discovered through contemplative prayer. The *“false*

*self”* is the illusion we have grown up believing, and often cherish even more than our relationship with God. When prayer becomes an intimate conversation with God – our Abba Father – God will reveal to us this *“true self”* that God created us to be in this world. The *“seeds”* in the title of the book are the seeds of God’s Will that are planted in us and grow to fruition as we live out God’s Will in this world. Merton describes the *“false self”* as the part of us that wants to live outside of God’s Will, believing that because God loves us as we are God is somehow finished with us.

Before we can help others understand why the Good News of Jesus is the Truth that will set them free, we have to be sure we understand and have already been set free ourselves. How

many of us are fully committed to the Kingdom of God? How many of us still hold on to the illusion that money, possessions and personal pleasure will bring us fulfillment? I encourage you to begin to have contemplative conversations with God and listen with the intent to act according to what God tells you.

# APRIL STEWARDSHIP

According to the American Heart Association there are seven main things everyone should do to keep your heart healthy. (1) Avoid smoking and using tobacco products; (2) Be physically active every day; (3) Eat a heart healthy diet; (4) Maintain a healthy weight; (5) Manage your blood pressure; (6) Control your cholesterol; and, (7) Keep your blood sugar healthy.

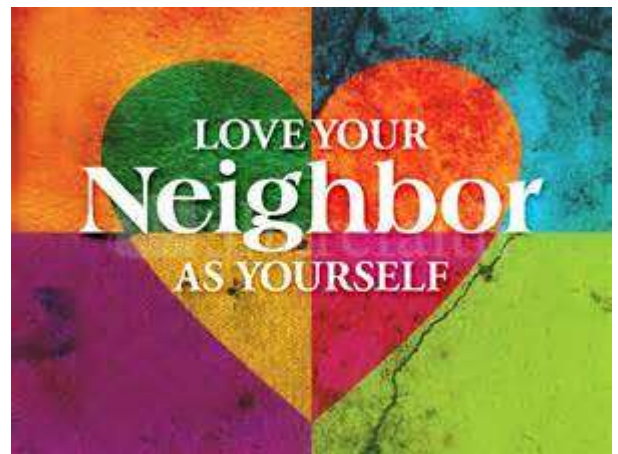
The human heart weighs less than a pound. I have read that the heart beats 115,200 times per day and 3,363,840,000 times in the average lifetime. As an adult your system of blood vessels – arteries, veins and capillaries – is close to 100,000 miles long, nearly enough to go around the world four times. Without your heart your body would cease to work. Heart disease is the number one cause of death in the Western Hemisphere.



That is all about your physical heart. God's Word speaks about your spiritual heart. In God's Word the heart is not the seat of emotions as we consider it; the spiritual heart is the seat of the human will. The spiritual heart is where we decide

whether we will or will not be obedient to God's Will. God also wants us to have a healthy spiritual heart. God is more interested in whose our "will" is than what we say or what we do. God said to the prophet Samuel *"The Lord doesn't see things the way you see them. People judge by outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart"* (1 Samuel 16:7, NLT).

When one of the teachers of the law asked Jesus which was the greatest commandment Jesus replied, *"The most important commandment is this: 'Listen, O Israel! The LORD our God is the one and only LORD. And you must love the LORD your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength.' The second is equally important: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' No other commandment is greater than these"* (Mark 12:29-31, NLT).



At the heart of our relationship with God and with one another is a heart filled with obedience to God's Will, and that commitment can only come about through love, both vertical and horizontal. God has Samuel choose David to replace Saul as king of Israel because God is seeking someone committed to God's own heart – God's Will.

Jesus came to make us righteous before God. The way to be righteous before God, Jesus says, is to love God with your whole heart, mind, and strength – everything in you – to be someone committed to God's own heart – doing God's Will; and, to love your neighbor out of that same love. In God's Word love is an action word, not an emotion, not sentimentality and – as the song says – others will know that you are a Christian by your love.

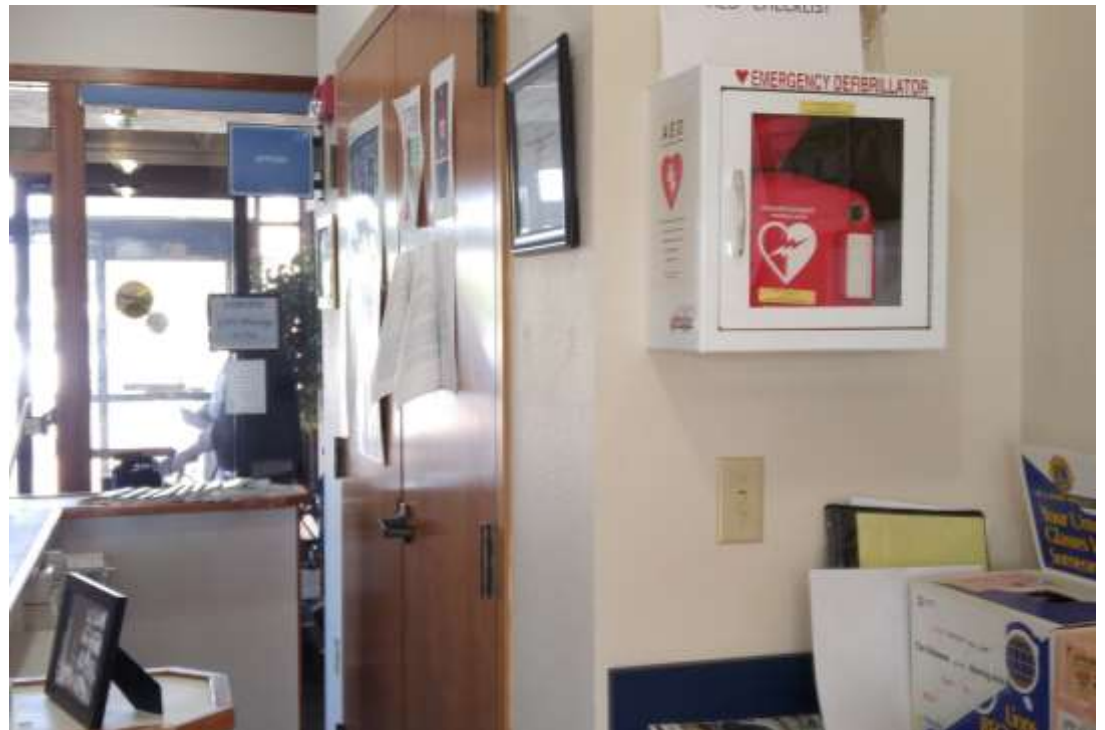

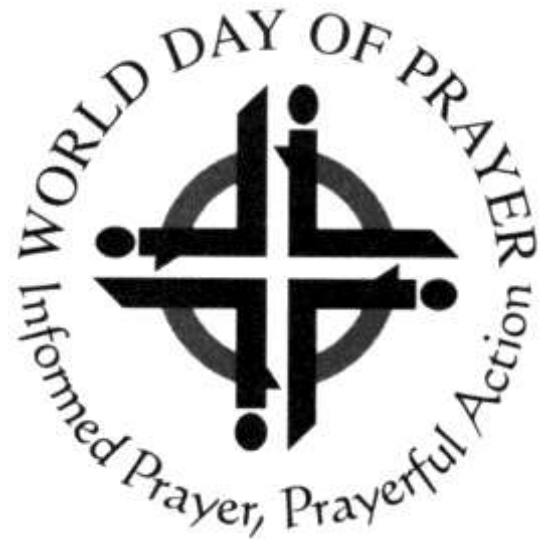
### Rummage Sale Donation

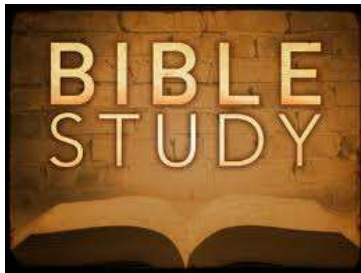
