## A message from Pastor Allman by David Allman

As I write this Candy and I are at the Florida-Bahamas Synod the Assembly. This vear Assembly is less business and experiential more and educational. Sadly, attendance was down at the beginning of the Assembly. Generally there are close to 500 (or more) people from the various congregations in Florida. We began with a mere 315, of which only 109 were active rostered leaders and 182 were lay people, along with some visitors, vendors, guests, etc.

A book I am currently reading for my Spiritual Direction class asks the question, "Why are we here?" I think the book was thinking of a more existential auestion to the human than experience, а simple attendance at a Synod Assembly; yet, it sparked in my mind the question, "Why did I come to the Assembly this year; and, why have others chosen to be absent?"

In Bishop Suarez's opening remarks this year he stated that the two greatest enemies of congregations today are fear and apathy. I wonder how much of the lack of attendance at the Assembly was due to apathy. Did people just not care about the Assembly? Was it because, as some speculated, that we were not electing a Bishop; therefore, not as important? Do some need a heavy business agenda to make it worth attending? Does the experiential and educational aspect make it less appealing?

Our Bishop's mention of the fear "enemy" of the church is something I have spoken and written about before. When

asked why Christians resist inviting others to Church the most frequent reasons have at their foundation some kind of fear: being rejected, losing friends, not knowing how to respond to questions, etc.

In comparison, the book I am currently reading suggests that one of the reasons we are uncomfortable with silence in our personal prayer time is because we fear having to face truth about some deep ourselves; that is, something we keep "buried" under busy-ness and the 'noise' of the world to which we give our attention (TV, radio. internet. news outlets. work. conversations. social media, etc.). All of these outside things to which we give our attention help cover up the inside things we are not yet prepared to face.

Is there something "inside us" about inviting others to Church that we are not yet prepared to face, and possibly overcome? The ELCA representative to our Assembly asked an interesting question of the group. "Do we love to tell the story (as the hymn suggests); or, do we only love the story?" No doubt we love to hear the story; although the lack of sharing of the gospel seems to indicate that we do not actually love to tell the story to outsiders.

Our keynote speaker at the Assembly reminded us that everyone has a story. We may not consider ourselves story tellers, although we tell stories every day -- that is, we share our lives in a narrative fashion every day. None of us walk around spouting pure facts all day long. Sometime during the day you will tell someone about something that happened to you. With Candy and I the narratives start with "SO!" and the other knows to stop and pay attention because a story is coming.

In our Bishop's opening remarks to the Assembly he asked, "Can we articulate why Jesus is important to us?" If you do not already know the answer I will give it to you... the answer is "Yes." Every single one of us has a story about how we came to Jesus and why we keep coming to Jesus. "Apathy" -- one of the enemies of our congregation - goes away when we realize we have a story to tell and can tell it.

## JULY STEWARDSHIP

At this year's Synod Assembly the keynote speaker, Pastor David Lose, asked us to guess what percentage of Lutherans actively participated in some kind of Bible study. He then said that groups of Lutherans normally guess too high; i.e. 50%, 25%, 15%, etc. Then he told us that the answer is 6%. As of 2016 the ELCA had 3.6 million members. Six percent of that would be 216,000. On the surface that does not sound too bad, does it? Redeemer's membership is around 370, so 6% of that would be 22 people, which is just about the number of people who come on Thursdays at 10:00 AM.


Pastor Lose also told us that Lutherans generally know two, or maybe two-and-a-half things about the Bible: (1) It is really important; and, (2) We do not know it very well. The half thing is that we all know that there are some people that regularly go to Bible study. The fact that many do not know it very well can negatively impact their decisions about attending a Bible study. The very thought of sitting with the 6% of the people who do study the Bible can make those who do not study the Bible feel anxious, insecure, ashamed, or maybe like an "imposter" sitting in with experts.

Please trust me, and I think I can dare to speak for our regular attenders, that none of us feel like experts, including me. In fact, many of us have a hard time remembering what we talked about the week before; and, if we skip a week (or more) due to my schedule we spend about ten minutes reviewing what we talked about the last time we were together. In fact, I would dare say that even if you know absolutely nothing about the Bible, you could still come to the Thursday morning Bible study and Grow in Faith. You do not even need to bring a Bible. We have plenty here if someone needs one.



Pastor Lose taught that there are two kinds of truth: (1) Scientific/factual truth, and very few people spend their days speaking only in facts; and, (2) Narrative truth, that is truth told in story, which is what the Bible does, and what each one of us does. We all relate to others by way of story. When I ask Candy how her day was, I want to hear her story not a bunch of facts.

I invite you to join us as we "Grow in Faith" through Bible study, whether you come on Thursday mornings, or participate in a different group, or simply read your Bible at home as part of a regular devotional time. Join your story to God's story, which began (for us) as God's Spirit moved over the waters, and continues today as each of us add our own narrative.

## July Benevolence Sun City Center Veterans' Memorial

Have you heard the news that the Sun City Center Charitable Foundation, Inc. in cooperation with local military and community are planning the construction of a Veterans' Memorial in Sun City Center? It is going to be located in front of the SCC Community Hall on Pebble Beach Blvd. S. Engraved bricks are being sold in two sizes: \$100 for a 4x8-inch brick and \$200 for an 8x8-inch square brick. The Memorial will honor our past, current and future male and female veterans and their families while at the same time promoting pride. Benevolence monies collected throughout the month of July will be used to purchase a brick for the Veteran's Memorial and help with the costs of building and maintaining the memorial. What a great way to show our love and support and let others know about Redeemer Church this way!

Walt Cawein, president of the Sun City Center Charitable Foundation, has shared with us that the organization hopes to have the memorial completed by the first week on November for a dedication just before Veteran's Day! There are a lot of pieces that need to come together for the

completion date to be met. A black granite monument is coming from India; a bronze eagle is coming from Baltimore, and a war dog "Warlock" is being sculpted by an artist in Salt Lake City. Construction teams will be needed for the job, but since this is a smaller scale job it will likely fall behind larger jobs these companies may have. The memorial will have a total of 8,000 bricks along with 7 flags (U.S., 5 service flags, and a Florida State flag). As of the end of May 350 engraved bricks have been sold. Sun City Center Charitable Foundation would love to have every business, church, club, resident and organization show their support by contributing something to the success of this memorial. ## CHOLESTEROL

What the Numbers Mean

HEALTHY Cholesterol Levels

Total Under 200 mg/dL

LDL Under 100 mg/dL

**Cholesterol** — the waxy, fat-like substance found in your blood — is naturally produced by your body. About 75 percent of cholesterol is made in your liver and other cells, and it's a needed part of your digestive system. Cholesterol also comes from the animal-based foods you eat, ranging from steak to whole milk to eggs.

Cholesterol exists in two distinct forms: High-density lipoprotein (HDL) cholesterol and low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol. HDL cholesterol is considered "good" cholesterol because it helps prevent fatty buildup along your arteries. LDL cholesterol is known as "bad" cholesterol because it does just the opposite, building up in the walls of your blood vessels. When cholesterol-based material, or plaque, builds up along your arteries, it clogs them and can lead to blockages.

If your cholesterol numbers indicate you're at risk for heart disease or stroke, work with your doctor on a plan to lower your LDL cholesterol and raise your HDL cholesterol. Many people can lower their risk and improve their numbers with changes in diet and exercise and by quitting smoking. Reducing saturated fats can also help decrease LDL. In some cases, your doctor may need to treat your high cholesterol with medication. If you have heart disease or diabetes, your MD may want these numbers even lower.
