A message from Pastor Allman by Pastor David Allman

"Stronger Together" is a term that is often used when we (the ELCA) talk about full communion partners - that is, other Christian denominations with which we enjoy sharing communion at the Table of the Lord; and, a clergy person from one denomination can serve a congregation from the other. As I was reading an article about being "stronger together" it inspired me to think about how this is also appropriate language to help us as a congregation here at Redeemer.

In my humble opinion our society has taught us to be too independent. A few weeks ago someone showed me a picture taken outside of a building which had about fifteen people standing close enough to be in the same picture together, yet separated enough that every one of them was busy doing

something on their respective cell phones. I know many of you are thinking you are not that addicted to your cell phone. That is not my point. It is simply one illustration.

My point is that picture perfectly illustrates how much we have become separated from the people around us, even when we are all sitting in the same worship space together on Sunday morning. Think for a minute about how many of the people sitting around you on Sunday morning you could say you actually know very well. Could you name the fifteen people who sit closest to you every Sunday? What about WELCA? Do you know each of the names of the others who come? What about the Bible Study? Do each of you who come know the names of the others who come every week? The same with our folks who gather for snacks and beverages after Sunday worship; how many of the people sitting at the other tables could you name?

Why is that important? Because we are stronger together. Because we are one body of Christ with many members. Because there may come a time when I announce that a person has made the transition into their heavenly home; and, you did not recognize the name so you did not come to the memorial service; and, too late you realize that person had sat right behind you every Sunday for years.

Please consider these questions carefully. When you look at the large list of names in our prayer concerns every week, are they more than simply a bunch of letters on a page? When we list the Council members in the Annual Report, can you say you know each of

them? How about the peoples' names who write the Ministry Team reports? Can you put a face with the name? Do you know the names of the people who sing in the choir every week? Do you know the names of the people who serve in the kitchen every week? The Altar Guild? The Ushers? I could go on and on with these questions.

The point is not to shame anyone. The point is to think about all of the ways that we can be stronger together. The people doing ministry at and attending Redeemer are your brothers and sisters in Christ. Every one of us is part of the same family of God. God does not want us to simply be a bunch of individuals who sit in the same space on Sunday morning without ever interacting. God expects us to come together in love and support of one another so that we are stronger.

How might we (at Redeemer) become stronger together if each of you took the time to get to know someone new every week?

SEPTEMBER STEWARDSHIP

"Always be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves together with peace... there is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all, in all, and living through all" (Ephesian 4:2-3, 5-6).

Can you imagine telling your best friend that you love her/him and want to spend as much time with her/him as possible, although you cannot stand to be around her/his child (or grandchild) and you cannot stand to be in the same room as that child (or grandchild)? Would that "best friend" think you were being sincere about loving her/him?

Can you imagine telling God how much you love and cherish God; and, that you cannot wait to spend time with God each morning after you wake? Can you imagine wanting God to believe your heart is sincere, and at the same time hating one or more of God's children because she/he disagrees with you politically, racially, ethnically, religiously, etc.?

Think about whichever Christian you simply cannot stand to be in the same room with, then imagine bowing your head and praying, "God, please believe that I love you with all my heart and want to follow your ways, although I cannot stand your daughter/son, (fill in the name), so please make sure I never have to be in the same room with her/him" (fill in the blank with the name of the person you cannot stand).

It is not easy, is it? At least I hope it is not easy. Even if you cannot stand to think of that other Christian as a sister or brother in Christ, you cannot deny that other Christian is a child of God; "...one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all..." How sincere will God believe you to be about loving God with all of your heart, if you carry hate in your heart for one or more of God's children?

The second part of our Mission Statement is that we "Grow in Faith." That does not only mean learning more about God. It also means learning to love others as we love ourselves, especially those we find it hard to love.


Benevolence and Social Ministry Project September 2018

Blood pressure is a key indicator of how well the cardiovascular system is functioning and can signal many diseases and conditions.

There is a healthy blood pressure range, and having too high or too low blood pressure can cause serious, long-term health consequences. Unfortunately, many people with poor blood pressure may not realize they're at risk. According to the American Heart Association, an optimal blood pressure range is at or less than 120/80.

This is what those numbers mean:

The top number (120) is your "systolic blood pressure." It indicates how much pressure the blood is
exerting while the heart is actively pumping into the blood vessels. The bottom number (80) is your
"diastolic blood pressure." It indicates how much pressure the blood is exerting between pumps
when your heart is at rest.

Which number is most important?

Both are important. Having a high number in either systolic or diastolic pressure can lead to a diagnosis of hypertension (high blood pressure) and is a risk factor for cardiovascular disease.

Hypertension (high blood pressure)

Hypertension is a common and dangerous condition. It causes persistent strain on both the heart and the blood vessels, which can lead to serious dysfunction. This can manifest as weakening of the heart, as well as damage to the blood vessels, causing various organ failure in the long-term.

There may be some symptoms that accompany hypertension — such as fatigue, shortness of breath and headaches — but in general, the condition shows no typical symptoms.

Hypertension can cause stroke, acute kidney failure, heart attack and blindness, among other ailments.

Risk factors for hypertension include age, high body weight, low activity level, poor diet, smoking, excessive alcohol consumption, high stress levels, certain chronic diseases (including diabetes) and a family/personal history with the condition.

Keeping body weight within a normal range, eating a heart-healthy diet, decreasing mental stress, and having a regular aerobic exercise routine can have a profound effect on blood pressure.


Women's Bible Study


