A message from Pastor Allman by Pastor David Allman

March 20th was the first day of spring, which does not make much difference weather wise in Florida. In northern parts of our country people have been eagerly anticipating the first day of spring, especially after the winter that they have experienced. With thoughts of spring comes the anticipation of warmer weather, green grass, budding trees, and colorful flowers. People who have felt “cooped up” all winter are excited about the prospects of enjoying the outdoors once again.

Easter is late in April this year (21st). Easter is a movable Church holy day. There is a formula for calculating the day for Easter based on what day spring, a.k.a. the vernal equinox, falls. There are a number of ways in which various people around the world celebrate the vernal equinox, which I will allow you to

research on your own. For mainline Christian denominations this involves Lent: The English word Lent is a shortened form of the Old English word len(c)ten, meaning “spring season.”

While Lent is not specifically connected to the first day of spring and the vernal equinox, we often think of Lent in terms of spring cleaning. It is a time to examine our lives and see how our life choices line up with how God encourages us to live. Some find that a little bit of “spring cleaning” may be in order. Hopefully over these forty days we have made some adjustments to bring our life choices more in line with God’s Will for our lives.

Easter is first and foremost a celebration of the Resurrection. In keeping with the idea of “spring cleaning” it can also be a

celebration of a renewed life in Jesus. We can celebrate a change in some habits that have been formed, may possibly hinder our relationship with Jesus, and now have been transformed. Martin Luther describes this as remembering that in our Baptisms we rise to new life in Jesus, and encourages us to keep on remembering that renewed life every day when we wake up.

This month we anticipate finishing up our midweek worship theme “At the Crossroads;” our book study “Before Amen;” Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter; as well as our regular Sunday worship services which are always days of celebration. It is a good time to be the Church. Come and join us.

Why do we strip the Altar on Maundy Thursday?

The altar is stripped at the end of the service as a symbolic remembrance of Christ's humiliation by the Roman soldiers when he was arrested after Judas Iscariot's betrayal. At the Last Supper, Jesus took the bread and wine and said, "This is my body and my blood shed for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Each item on the altar is a remembrance of this Last Supper. The Chalice that holds the wine, the Ciborium that holds the broken bread, and the Lavabo that holds the water for the washing of the hands are removed one by one. In addition to the items for Holy Communion, the cloths on the altar are also removed piece by piece and put away until Easter Sunday. They include the Symbolic Cloths for wiping the rim of the Chalice and wiping of hands after washing and the Corporal Linen that was used to cover the face of Jesus for his burial.

The last piece of material removed is the Fair Linen. The Fair Linen is the first Linen that is placed on the Altar and remains there, removed only on Holy Thursday. This cloth was used to wrap the broken body of Jesus for burial.

This is a solemn ceremony. Remember His sacrifice He gave for us and for our Redemption.

Maundy Thursday and Good Friday are important. The choir wants to remind everyone that if we didn't have Maundy Thursday or Good Friday we would not have Easter. We hope to see you at these services. Our choir has been practicing some beautiful hymns that were selected especially for these two services.

Mark your calendars.

The Maundy Thursday Service will be held at 7:00 PM on April 18th. The Good Friday Service will be at 7:00 PM on April 19th.

April Social Ministry Haven of Hope

Haven of Hope is a faith based non-profit Prison Transitional Ministry. Volunteers work with women who were incarcerated for various crimes. They assist each woman to get back on her feet. Through Christian teachings the women are provided life-skills training.

The group has many needs to support these women. They have a 6 bed home they rent in Ruskin. A list of needed items will be available on the Social Ministry Table. The big wish is for a new vacuum cleaner.

We ask that you consider supporting this cause. As Janet Smith told me it cost \$30,000 a year for one inmate in prison but Haven of Hope estimates their cost at \$7,200 annually per resident.

If you choose to donate money, please write "Haven of Hope" on your envelope. Money collected will be put towards the vacuum cleaner. Thank you

From the Parish Nurse Team

Balance by Linda Eargle

My balance isn't what it used to be and for some of us (at least for me) my balance has never been the best. However, maintaining/improving balance and preventing falls is a huge problem for us all. The Federal government has invested billions of dollars to figure out why we fall and how we can reduce our risk. One website with lots of information is <https://www.cdc.gov/steady/index.html> . (Steady.gov) Steady stands for Stopping Elderly Accidents, Deaths, Injuries.

Prevention

- Wear proper shoes (no flip flops or loose fitting shoes and no socks without shoes)
- Clean up floor clutter to avoid tripping
- Proper lighting to avoid shadows and to see objects or water on the floor
- Step deliberately and with authority, avoid hurrying and try not to shuffle with small steps.
- Maintain good posture, strength and mobility
- Know the side effects of medications (dizziness, decreased blood pressure)
- Stand securely before walking. At night, sit on the side of the bed for 30 seconds before you put your feet on the floor.

Fear of Falling

Fear of falling and having had a fall in the last 3 months are predictors of future falls. Here are a couple of questions from the Falls Self-Efficacy test: Are you concerned about cleaning the house, getting dressed, preparing meals, taking a shower/bath, getting in/out of a chair or walking around the neighborhood? If you are uncomfortable with any of these, talk to your doctor and request a referral to Physical Therapy. Some Medicare plans will pay for a physical therapist without a referral and Florida law allows Physical Therapist to work with you for 30 days.

Balance exercises

After you see the physical therapist, research shows that daily exercise matters. Fall risk is reduced by as much as 62% with 10 minutes a day of balance exercise. My exercise is done at the kitchen sink where I can be safe. The Canadian lifeline website, <https://www.lifeline.ca/en/resources/14-exercises-for-seniors-to-improve-strength-and-balance/>, has an excellent series of exercises, but use the kitchen sink rather than a chair for balance. Community programs in Tai Chi and Yoga are available and research shows Tai Chi and Yoga are effective in reducing falls.

Don't be embarrassed or ignore falls! Forty percent of the Sun City Center Emergency Squad calls are for falls. Statistics indicate that one in four of us will REPORT falling each year. Many falls are not reported. Be safe!

A Message from Council

Keep in mind that there are some simple Rules of Conduct that we ask that you follow if you want to attend a Council meeting.

1. If you have a specific topic that you would wish to bring to a meeting, please provide a written description to the Chair one week prior to the meeting so the committee or team can have the information properly prepared in the agenda.
2. The topic that you wish to discuss will, as a rule, be discussed as the first item to the agenda so that you may leave if you desire.
3. If you are simply attending the proceedings, no advance notice is required.
4. Guests may not vote and cannot participate in the discussions unless asked by the chair to do so.

As always we welcome your interest and ideas.

A Notice from Council on Easter Parking

As Easter approaches our minds also turn toward practical matters, such as having adequate parking for people who come here to worship. We remind you that the SCC Funeral Home (next door) graciously allows us to use their parking lot on Sunday mornings for the overflow parking. If you are able to park there and have no mobility issues, please consider doing so. Also, in past years, we have had people parking in our lot who were not worshipping with us. On weekdays this is not an

issue, although on Sunday mornings we need every parking space we have, plus some.

While we hate to appear rude, we feel past experiences warrant these actions: In April you may notice signs at each entrance declaring this parking lot is for Redeemer members and guests. Also in April, on our Welcome Table, you will find paper to place in the windshield of your car or golf cart which will let others know you can park here. In years past some of our members attempted to ensure that our parking lot was being used by people worshipping with us. Often our members met resistance from those misusing our parking lot, and at times verbal insults and profanity. Our members should not have to endure that on Easter, so this year we have requested an off-duty Sheriff's deputy to be in the parking lot between 8:00 AM and 11:00 AM on Easter morning. The deputy will only engage those who park in our lot and are walking elsewhere, to ask them to park somewhere else.

We anticipate visitors for Easter, and if you know someone will be joining us, please feel free to take a sign for their windshield as well. Also, we expect the Sheriff's deputy will only approach those who do not appear to be walking toward our building. We wish to be neighborly **and** also have a responsibility to our members and guests. We trust that you will understand that these decisions have been based on need because of past experiences.

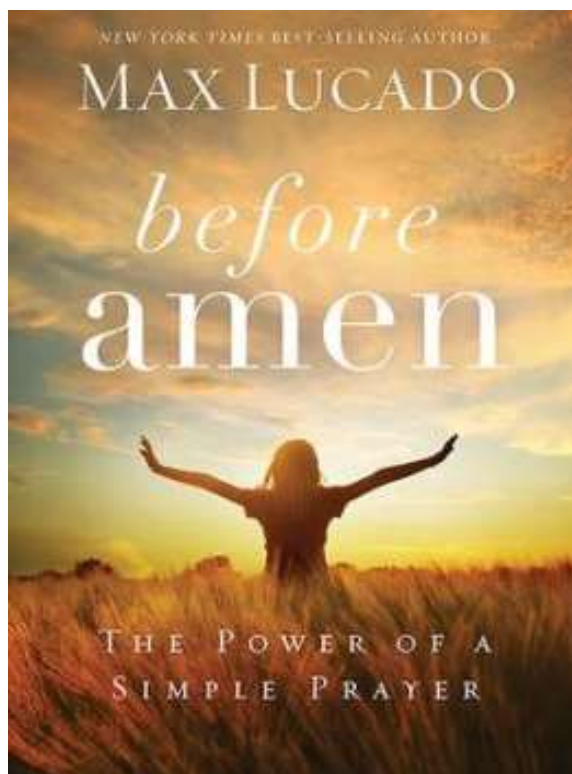


Redeemer Library News
