A Message from Pastor Allman

The Reverend Nicky Gumble "holy describes Vision as a discontent deep а _ dissatisfaction with what is combined with a clear grasp of what could be. It is a picture - a mental sight - of the future that inspires hope. Vision without action is merely a dream. Action without vision is a nightmare! But vision with action can change the world."

Proverbs 29:18 reads, "Where there is no vision, the people perish. "Vision is not ours to create. Vision comes from God as revelation. As individuals the best way to receive God's vision/revelation is to pattern our lifestyle and activity after Jesus. We are to become as Christ-like as possible. This cannot be a one-time decision and it will not happen overnight. It involves a daily decision to live each day in the way that Jesus has taught us.

As the Body of Christ at Redeemer, we have elected leaders to the Council, selected leaders for each ministry team, and staff members; all of whom are here to guide us into God's preferred future for Redeemer. It is essential that everyone at Redeemer be following God's vision/revelation for Redeemer. As individuals each of us can pray for our leadership to receive God's vision/revelation and for the courage to move Redeemer in that direction.

Why would that require courage? Because God's Vision may require change, and change is not easy. Mark Twain is credited with saying that the only person who likes change is a baby with a full diaper. Change is difficult in the church because people become content to do things the way we have always done them. When God's Vision (*holy discontent*) requires a change then we have to choose to obey or disobey. Neither decision is easy.

Author and business analyst Jim Collins wrote that "Good is the enemy of great;" meaning that many businesses and people never attain greatness because they settle for "good enough." While reading this article you may have been thinking that we already have a "good" Church, which is true; although, God's preferred future for Redeemer is not to settle for "good enough."

When I started here almost seven years ago God gave me a Vision for Redeemer, from Jeremiah 29:11, *"I alone know the plans I have for you, plans to bring you prosperity and not* disaster, plans to bring about the future you hope for." My daily prayer is that God lead me so that I can guide Redeemer into God's preferred future; and, I ask that you pray every day for me and for Redeemer's leadership. Let that be a New Year's Resolution you never break.

I must confess that I sometimes wonder how many people actually read these articles. In my most pessimistic moments I think people see the word "Stewardship" and quickly move on to the next page; while they may be thinking "*The church is asking for money again.*"



While money is part of stewardship, and a very important part, it is not the only part. Two other parts include how you spend your time; and, how you use your God-given gifts and talents. Some people use their time and talents in ways that will help them make and keep as much money as possible. For example, America's 10 wealthiest people gave an average of 0.94% of their net worth to charity in 2018. By contrast the average American gives about 3.7% to charity; and, the average Lutheran gives about 2% to their church.

When asked, most Lutherans will say that how much money they give to the Church is between them and God. We, at Redeemer, could not agree more; and, that is why we encourage everyone to have a frank and open conversation with God to ask God how much money to give, how much time to give, and how to best use those God-given talents to serve God. If God was not part of the decision, then God has not been part of the conversation.



Prayer was an essential part of Jesus' earthy life. In fact, Jesus prayed so long and so often (sometimes all night) that his disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray. These were devout Jews who had been taught ritual prayer since childhood; yet there was something different about the way Jesus related to God in prayer. If anyone knew the Will of God it was Jesus, yet Jesus modeled for us the need to be persistent in conversation with God.

On December 8th (in a sermon) I shared some statistics that about 33% of Protestants attend worship regularly; 44% of Christians say they pray once a week, once a month, seldom or never; and, while 87% of Christians say they own a Bible, 76% say they seldom or never read it. Those are the three ways in which God reveals himself to us, so I cannot help but wonder how those people know what God wants for and from them.

As we enter a new year and a new decade, let me encourage you to make New Year's Resolutions to spend more time in worship, spend more time in prayer, and spend more time in God's Word. Amen.

January Evangelism

For Christian Today an Australian magazine, Danielle Jones writes about "Awkward Evangelism" saying: On my top ten list of fears, next to wasps, shark attacks and missing clearance sales, was evangelism. The mere idea of walking up to a stranger and handing them a pamphlet or asking them in an intrusive monotone if I could share with them about Jesus made me feel nauseous.



She goes on to write that most people, likely including many of us, do not appreciate an uninvited intrusion into our day or life, no matter what the subject matter, even if it deals with eternal salvation. Most people, again likely including us, do not like generic forms of evangelism which sound like an impersonal, rehearsed speech.


In my humble opinion I think most people are, in the <u>right context</u>, open to talking about <u>their</u> spirituality and beliefs. The question to ask is whether we are willing to actively listen before we speak. Actively listening is a learned skill. Before we can learn it, we may have to unlearn the practice of formulating our response while the other is speaking and jump in with our comments as soon as the person pauses for a breath. Active listening involves practiced silence and completely focusing on what the other is saying. It may mean waiting a long time before responding.

The previously mentioned author cites how Jesus approached ordinary people like the Samaritan woman at the well. He began their conversation by simply asking for a drink of water, and ultimately taught her about the living waters of eternal life. She, in turn, spoke to the people in her village and invited them to "come and see" Jesus for themselves.

Everyone has been given a specific gift or talent from God. Some of us may be great at holding an engaging conversation, while others are good at writing, or making people laugh, or painting, or dancing. That means that we are not limited in the way in which we share our faith story. Rather we are gifted in the way in which we share our faith story (conversation, writing, laughing, painting, dancing, etc.).

Our responsibility is not to "make" others believe what we believe. We simply share why we believe what we believe, and likely we will plant a seed or water a seed that has already been planted. Growing that seed to maturity is up to God...

Women of the ELCA Meeting



Prayer List Proposal

Our church has a prayer list for the following purposes: to encourage individuals; to unify the people of the church; to reinforce a person's commitment to talk to God and seek God's peace.

We have listed the prayer list policy below for everyone to review. Please keep these items in mind when you are adding someone to the prayer list in the future. Please call Kadie in the office if you have any updates to make regarding the prayer list.

Policy:

--Any person's name published on the church's prayer list should always be with that individual's expressed permission.

--People requesting prayer support may ask to be placed on the prayer list for a specific length of time. If a time period is not specified, then the maximum time period will be thirteen Sundays unless another request is submitted.

--People requesting prayers for friends or family may ask for a specific time period for the listing; otherwise, a length of four Sundays will apply.

--People making prayer requests would be most helpful if they supplied their name and contact information. Prayer requests should made through the pastor and/or a staff member verbally and/or by completing the prayer request form found outside the church secretary's office.

--Prayer requests for specific health issues should not list the health issue in writing or be verbally discussed in order to comply with the HIPPA Privacy Rules.

We are called! By Kathryn A. Kleinhans

Reformer Martin Luther used the word "vocation" or "calling" to refer to all aspects of human life. We are called to respond to God not just in our personal relationship with God but in our relationships with family and friends, in our work, and in our communities. This four-part Bible study will explore stories from both the Old and New Testament. As we reflect on how our biblical forebears heard and responded to God's call, we will gain insight into how God is calling us—and how God may be calling others through us.

Session 1: Hearing God's Call

This session focuses on men and women in the Old Testament. Some of them heard and recognized God's call clearly. Others struggled to realize that it was God who was calling them or exactly what God was calling them to do. What can we learn from their stories?




Ice would be nice
