A Message from Pastor Allman

"We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in constantly prayers. remembering before our God and Father your work of faith labor and and of love steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Thessalonians 1:2-3).

That quote is from the second reading on 10/18/2020, and what stood out most to me from these two verses was the phrase "steadfastness of hope." According to the dictionary "steadfastness" is defined as "the quality of being resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering." Does this mean that we always get that for which we hope? Absolutely not. It means that despite the fact that we do not always get that for which we hope, we remain unwavering in our hope.

For example, I continue to hope that one day I will win hundreds of millions of dollars in the lottery, despite the fact I do not buy a ticket. I encourage those who are feeling anxious to add Niebuhr's prayer to your daily prayers. Stay healthy. Stay safe. Stay blessed.

NOVEMBER STEWARDSHIP

Why is this a Stewardship article? Part of Stewardship is lived out in the way we care for and about others. Philippians 2:3 (NRSV) reads, "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves." What follows is an idea about HOW we may gather for in-person worship again – not WHEN.

HOW we gather together again for worship will look very different from the way we gathered before this pandemic. What follows is long, and it is the latest draft our Council has discussed about HOW Redeemer can gather together in large group worship in the safest way currently known. Please understand that the Council is making decisions that we believe are in the best interests of the entire community at Redeemer.

By now everyone should understand that entering the building and participating in person for worship carries a higher level of risk than many other activities. By entering the building and participating in person for worship you will be assuming all risk for yourselves. Redeemer cannot be held liable for anyone who may contract COVID-19 by entering the building or gathering for in-person worship. We strongly encourage those most at risk to remain safer at home and worship via the live stream.

By entering the building for in person worship you agree to adhere to the guidelines and recommendations. These are the <u>guidelines</u> and <u>recommendations</u> as set forth by the Redeemer Lutheran Church Council for returning to in-person worship:

Phase Three of the Governor's Plan to reopen Florida has now begun as of Friday, September 25th. Here is what that plan says regarding the majority, if not all, of Redeemer's community:

Individuals older than 65 years of age and individuals with a serious underlying medical condition (such as chronic lung disease, moderate-to-severe asthma, serious heart conditions, immune-compromised status, cancer, diabetes, severe obesity, renal failure and liver disease [some lists also include high blood pressure]) can resume public interactions, but should practice social distancing, minimizing exposure to social settings where distancing may not be practical, unless precautionary measures are observed.

Please understand that returning to in-person worship does <u>not</u> mean returning to the worship experience we had prior to March 15th. The inperson worship experience will include many changes and precautionary measures.

Best practice <u>guidelines</u> and <u>recommendations</u> from epidemiologists, medical experts and the ELCA and Florida-Bahamas Synod Bishops (respectively) have recommended that we "Delay in-person gathering until the State of Florida moves to Phase 3 and/or until your area has experienced a decline in cases for 14 consecutive days." Over the past fourteen days (as of this writing) the State of Florida has fluctuated between 2000-3600 new positive cases per day; and, Sun City Center has demonstrated a steady, yet slow, increase in cases. Nationally, we have increased from an average of 35,000 (per day) in September to 50,000 (per day) in October.

The Council (hereafter "We") requests potential attendees to RSVP to the office each week by phone or email so we will have an idea as to how many people to expect. Attendance will be limited to the first 50 people. Also, we remind everyone that if they are in the <u>at-risk category</u> or <u>not feeling well</u>, please refrain from attending.



We will limit our worship service to one each Sunday and continue our virtual (live stream) services for those who do not wish to attend in person until the risk is diminished further.

Masks (covering the mouth <u>and</u> nose) have proven to be most effective in slowing or stopping the spread of this pandemic when worn by <u>everyone</u>; therefore, masks will be worn before, during, and after the service. We will have disposable masks available if someone does not have one or has forgotten theirs. You can help Redeemer save money by bringing your own mask.

KEEPING YOU SAFER

Protect yourself and others by wearing a face covering correctly.









Full choir activities in worship continue to be suspended and we recommend that the gathered people refrain from singing out loud during the service. Please feel encouraged to sing to God in your spirit (silently) where God can hear. The same is true for the congregational responses during the service; please respond silently in your spirit where God can hear.

We will ensure that the air-conditioning systemfans in the sanctuary remain running during the service to provide constant air circulation. This may mean that the temperature is cooler than comfortable for some. Please feel encouraged to bring some extra clothing that will help you feel comfortable.

Hand sanitizer will be available for entering and exiting the building. You can help Redeemer save money by carrying your own hand sanitizer with you, if that has not already become your habit.



Ushers <u>may</u> not be present during the immediate weeks after reopening. When we have ushers again, they will greet from a distance and with no handshakes.

People are reminded and strongly encouraged to maintain physical distancing at <u>all</u> times – at least 6-feet. We strongly encourage those gathering inperson <u>not</u> to have conversations in the building. We understand many are missing the social aspects of gathering; and, we encourage you to feel free to gather on your own in the parking lot near your cars if you wish to socialize, which will provide physical distancing for others to enter and exit the building efficiently.

Paper bulletins, for those who want them, will be available on the Welcome Table, along with hand sanitizer and disposable masks. If you use a paper bulletin, please <u>take it home</u> with you to keep or dispose of at your discretion. Please <u>do not</u> leave your used bulletin in the building as this means someone else may (potentially) be placed at risk cleaning up after the service.

Recommendations are that we continue to refrain from Holy Communion or use prepackaged communion kits. (IMHO: these are awkward to use and I (Pastor) have seen people fumble with them, causing the "wafer" to fall to the floor and roll away and the "grape juice" to be spilled, which means additional cleanup for someone, and/or stains on our cloth pews).

We will <u>not</u> be "sharing the peace" for the foreseeable future until it is considered once again safe to shake hands and/or hug.

Offering plates will be placed near the rear of the sanctuary, to allow offerings to be given while entering or exiting the worship service. Those staying safer at home may continue to mail their offering to Redeemer and/or consider electronic giving.

Rows of pews will be taped off to allow 6 feet between each row. This will mean that some of you may not be able to sit in the pew where you have always sat before. We understand that this will feel inconvenient for some, although we believe this small inconvenience is worth it to ensure everyone's safe distancing.

Pews will also be taped to show 6 feet distance between seats. People from different households should sit 6 feet apart and in different rows. Attendees from the same household may sit together in the same row. We understand that this will feel inconvenient for some, although we believe this small inconvenience is worth it to ensure everyone's safe distancing.

When entering and exiting the sanctuary, please do not stop at the pews to speak to or hold conversations with those already seated. Attendees are reminded to keep moving while entering and exiting the building, and please do not congregate outside near any of the doors. Once again, conversations (if you wish them) are encouraged in the parking lot near your cars. This will provide physical distancing for others to enter and exit the building efficiently while physically distancing.

Water fountains should be not be used unless it is an emergency. Restrooms are available for those who absolutely need them. Restroom doors will remain propped open to eliminate the need to touch the handles. Hand sanitizer will be available in the three main restrooms closest to the sanctuary. Please do not use restrooms in other parts of the building.

People should refrain from approaching the chancel (altar) area unless deemed absolutely necessary. Pastor will continue to light and extinguish the candles. Lay readers (when we use one) can sit near the front pews to limit walking past others as much as possible when they enter/exit the pulpit.

Pastor will <u>not</u> be greeting people entering and exiting the building. Pastor will model physical distancing and refraining from conversations. Pastor will stay behind the Altar and/or in the Pulpit during worship. Pastor will wear a mask at all times when he is not speaking during worship. Please refrain from going into the Pastor's office before, during or after worship. Pastor is available during the week by phone; or in special circumstances by appointment.
