A Message from Pastor Allman

Starting Over! That seems to be a new catch phrase for our recovery from the past fifteen the COVID-19 months of Pandemic. I have been writing and telling people that we cannot "go back" to the ways things were pre-pandemic. I think people have been upset with me for saying that, although if you think about every major traumatic experience in history, it is not possible to go back to exactly the ways things were without some changes. Sometimes people refer to these adaptations as the "new normal." I think that phrase tends to irritate some folks too. although that may have more to do with our personal resistance to change than anything.

I think the Staff were the first to recognize that coming out of

complete lockdown and working to bring back some sense of the familiar is like starting all over from scratch. We started in November of 2020 by welcoming back in-person worship, although we had to start over with a new normal, having adapted to some of the changes to meet guidelines and recommendations.

With the introduction of each familiar thing, we have had to adapt to a new normal way of doing things: wearing masks, social distancing, carrying hand sanitizer, not hugging or shaking hands, leaving out parts of worship that might cause cross contamination, no fellowship, etc. When we started having Holy Communion again it began with wafer only; and, we are using a contactless distribution – not everyone likes it. On Easter we

included wine/grape juice again, although are doing we continuous communion - not everyone likes it. In May we welcomed Ministry Teams to begin meeting in-person, yet not every team has started doing that. On Pentecost we started over with Fellowship, while adapting to new normal ways of being social - probably not everyone likes it. Mark Twain has been credited with saying that the only people who like change are babies with dirty diapers.

I offer kudos to the Staff who, over the past fifteen months, have been handling nearly all of the work that has been necessary to keep Redeemer going. Some people may have been thinking that nothing was being done while the world was in lockdown. "Nothing" could be

further from the truth. Nearly all of the things that were being volunteers. bv predone pandemic, were being done by Staff over the past fifteen months. Now that some of the Ministry Teams are meeting inperson they are realizing that we need volunteers. Some have even said that we need "younger" people. That is something the Staff cannot do for you.

Starting Over! Each Ministry Team is going to feel like we are starting over. Some of the folks who used to volunteer cannot do it anymore. Some Ministry Team leaders cannot be leaders anymore. People who are still active on the respective Ministry Teams may need to elect a new leader, and may need to recruit new members to the Team.

Even more broadly, it would be great to have some "younger" people coming to Redeemer. Each of you is the best person to help make that happen. The majority of people who visit a congregation do so because of a personal invitation from one of the members. I like the "come and see" form of invitation. It is very non-threatening to invite someone to "come and see" for themselves. Then 70% of the people who become members cite "friendliness" as a major contributor to their decision. If someone visits and no one talks to them, they are likely never to return. Each of you instrumental in making those things happen. God has given each of you a sacred trust to grow His Kingdom.

Coming out of the COVID-19 Pandemic really is starting over from scratch, and we need everyone's participation to start over. Remember that the primary role of a church is a service organization; and, becoming a member means joining the service. We all like to sing, "Onward Christian Soldiers," and now is the time to enlist.




Even though I disconnect with "Vanessa" right after she tells me she is calling from "Dealer Services," and then I block her phone number, I routinely get another call from her the very next week. Over the past three weeks, my new "friend," Vanessa from Dealer Services, has called me at least once a week, despite me cutting her off in mid-sentence and blocking her phone number. She must have a lot of phone numbers from which to call. I have to give her credit for her persistence.

Her persistence has made me wonder about how we could learn a thing or two from her in regard to inviting people to "come and see" Redeemer; especially now that we have loosened up so many of the pandemic precautions and are returning to so many of the familiar ways of being church. "Vanessa" does not give up, even after I rejected her three latest attempts to talk to me and even blocked three of her phone numbers. She persists in finding a new way to reach out to me and talk to me about "Dealer Services." We could learn from her about finding new ways to invite someone to "come and see" Redeemer.

Apparently, she is very passionate about "Dealer Services." How else can I explain her persistence in finding new ways to reach out, even after I have been pretty rude to her? We say we love Jesus, and we say we love our church, yet I wonder how many of us have the same passion for Jesus and church as Vanessa has for Dealer Services. Perhaps you can answer that to yourself; and God, of course.

Redeemer is starting over from scratch as we recover from the COVID-19 Pandemic. We are not where use to be, and it truly is not possible to "go back" to the way things used to be. We can only move forward and develop a new normal. 
GROWING IN FAITH

A few years ago, I completed training to become a Spiritual Director, through the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, S.C. As Spiritual Director I journey alongside people on their quest to develop a deeper relationship with the Divine (Grow in Faith). Spiritual Direction is nothing new. This practice of a spiritual discipline was around even before Christianity became an organized religion.

Some people come to a deeper relationship with the Divine from different avenues; and, some people develop a deeper relationship with the Divine because their circumstance leaves them limited ways in which to deal with life.

Etty Hillesum (1914–1943) who died at Auschwitz at the age of 29 writes,

"I kneel once more on the rough coconut matting, my hands over my eyes, and pray: 'Oh, Lord, let me feel at one with myself. Let me perform a thousand daily tasks with love, but let every one spring from a greater central core of devotion and love.' Then it won't really matter what I do and where I am..." (An Interrupted Life: The Diaries).



During the Sundays of Easter we have, through Scriptures, encounter God's unconditional, $\alpha\gamma\alpha\eta\eta$ love; and, we have been called to the sacred responsibility of spreading and sharing that $\alpha\gamma\alpha\eta\eta$ love with the world – all of Creation. Etty Hillesum's brief life in this world demonstrates that even when we feel like our options are limited, there is much we can do to "…perform a thousand daily tasks with love." As she also demonstrated, it all starts with daily prayer.

OSTEOPOROSIS


Understanding Osteoporosis - Risk Factors - Diagnosis - Tratment - Prevention

- Identify and monitor osteoporosis and osteopenia
- -Assess your risk for developing fractures in the future
- -Monitor the effects of treatment for osteoporosis and other conditions that cause bone loss

Take calcium and vitamin D supplements



Eat diary and green vegetables



Exercise regularly



Take prescribed medication



Stop smoking



Limit alcohol consumption
