A Message from Pastor Allman

The word "liminal" comes from the Latin root, limen, which means "threshold." The liminal space is the "crossing over" space - a space where you have left something behind, while you are not yet fully in something else. In a sense the entire world has been in "liminal space" since the beginning of 2020. Even as we started thinking we had crossed over the threshold on the pandemic, we have discovered that the COVID virus has mutated and reared its ugly head once again.

Life for the entire world changed, adjusted, and changed again ... and now again. Believers around the world have been crying out "How long, O Lord?" Liminal space can feel scary. One this website explains it way: These spaces can often auicklv become scary or uncomfortable because it is not a space that we are used to being in for an extended period of time. In fact, liminal spaces are often cold and bare as people are expected to be just passing through them.(Linkedin)

I think liminal space is also scary because the time and events are outside of our control. While many of us would not categorize ourselves as "control freaks," I think we all have some need to feel like we are in control. It is important to accept what we can control and what we cannot. Something we have come to call the Serenity Prayer asks "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference, living one day at a time; enjoying one moment at a time; taking this world as it is and not as I would have it; trusting that You will make all things right if I surrender to Your will: so that I may be reasonably

happy in this life and supremely happy with You forever in the next. Amen" (Reinhold Niebuhr).

The part in each of us that longs for control, I think, has the most trouble with the line, *"taking this world as it is and not as I would have it."* Surrendering, even to God, is difficult in the best of times. In these scary times we are more apt to lash out at anyone who dares to disagree with us.

The Psalms are filled with examples of "crying out to God" from the depths of our despair; or, from the depths of our liminal space. Let me encourage each of us to start each day crying out to God with the words of the Serenity Prayer quoted above. "God grant me the serenity to…"

News from the Office Administrator







A devotional that I read sometime in July posed an interesting statement, which I kept note of in my prayer journal and reflect on from time to time. The writer said that trying to love God with a divided heart is like trying to view galaxies with a \$5.00 pair of binoculars. I think that was the point Jesus was making when he said, "No one can serve two masters..."



We do not have masters in this 21st Century USA, so the metaphor would not be as striking to us as it was in 1st Century Israel. Jesus' point, I think, was that trying to serve two masters at the same time would not prove valuable to either one. The servant's loyalty would become blurry; especially if the servant was being asked to divide into two different directions.

Likewise, trying to view galaxies with a \$5.00 pair of binoculars, I imagine, would be a little blurry. I have never actually had a \$5.00 pair of binoculars, so I cannot swear to how ineffective they would be, although it would stand up to reason that one could not view galaxies with cheap binoculars.

Have you ever listed out your priorities on paper? I have asked groups to do that before, and they include things like family, home, health, financial security, etc. Often, I find that people do not put God on the list, and when I ask about that the response is something like, "Well God is a given;" or, "God is always there."



That may sound reasonable in our minds, although in my humble opinion, it skirts the edge of selfjustification. How would it appear if I did not add my wife to my list of priorities, and justified that by saying, "Well, my wife is a given;" or, "My wife is always there"? Do you think my wife would be justifiably upset? I do. So, how do you think that makes God feel?

Jesus listed the greatest commandment as "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind" (Luke 10:27). Jesus uses the word "all" four times in that sentence, so I think he means it to be very important – no divided loyalties. When I consider God the top priority, I find that I treat all other people and things the way in which God instructs.

DELTA VARIANT to COVID 19

A newer strain of COVID-19 is causing concern as cases are rising across the U.S. <u>The Delta variant</u>, <u>which originated in India</u>, began spreading more rapidly in June and creating another surge of COVID-19. Here's what <u>health experts have learned about the Delta variant</u>:

1. Delta variant is highly contagious

According to the CDC, as of July 22, the Delta variant accounted for more than 80% of new cases in the U.S. Health experts say it's typical for a new strain of a virus to be more contagious because it often becomes much more efficient and easily transmitted.

2. Delta variant symptoms are the same

The symptoms of the Delta variant appear to be the same as the original version of COVID-19. However, people are getting sicker quicker. **Recent research found that the Delta variant grows more rapidly** – and to much greater levels – in the respiratory tract.

Typically, vaccinated people are either asymptomatic or have very mild symptoms if they contract the Delta variant. Their symptoms are more like those of a common cold, such as cough, fever or headache, with the addition of loss of smell.

3. Delta variant is affecting unvaccinated people more

Most patients hospitalized are people who have not received the COVID-19 vaccine. Nationally, 97% of patients hospitalized with COVID-19 are unvaccinated, as of July 22. Vaccines are highly effective at preventing COVID-19 infection and are also effective in fighting against the Delta variant. Health experts urge that COVID-19 vaccines work to prevent severe disease, which may be fatal.

4. Breakthrough cases for vaccinated people are rare, but do happen

When a vaccinated person tests positive for COVID-19, most either have no symptoms or have very mild symptoms, and it rarely results in hospitalization or death. Their symptoms are more like those of a common cold, such as cough, fever or headache, with the addition of loss of smell. As of July 22, 0.04% of vaccinated people reported breakthrough cases. No vaccine is 100% effective.

5. Many unvaccinated patients with COVID-19 wish they had gotten the vaccine

Physicians have noted that a number of patients, when they come in with critical illness, say that they wish they would have gotten the COVID-19 vaccine. Many have said, "Why did I not listen?"

6. Experts are recommending to wear masks, even if you're fully vaccinated

Many health experts across the country are wearing masks themselves even though they're fully vaccinated against COVID-19. They're also advising vaccinated people to mask up indoors in areas of high Covid spread (this includes Hillsborough County).

7. More COVID-19 variants are likely to come

The Delta variant is currently the most prominent strain of COVID-19, but the Lambda variant out of South America is also emerging. Health experts urge that if people want to get back to normal, a significant portion of the population needs to be vaccinated. As long as a chunk of people across the world are unvaccinated, new strains of the virus will continue to develop and cause problems.

Things That I "Knew" But That Have Changed with Delta

- Virus has an Ro of about 3
- Prolonged exposure (>15 min) needed for spread
- mRNA vaccine overall efficacy ~95%
- mRNA efficacy vs. severe cases >99%
- Immunity is long-lasting
- Vaxxed people can't spread virus

- Delta has an Ro of 7-8
- ~70-80% vax will reach herd immunity
 Herd immunity needs >85% vax; may be impossible
 - Less prolonged exposure (5 min, perhaps less) can result in spread
- Risk factors of bad outcomes known **Delta** cases may be more serious on average
 - mRNA vaccine overall efficacy vs. Delta ~85%
 - Efficacy vs. severe cases ~95%, 'lower in hi-risk groups'
 - Immunity (from vax or illness) wanes in ~6 months
 - Vaxxed people probably can spread

Notes:

- "Ro" refers to the number of cases, on average, an infected person will cause during their infectious period.
- The mRNA vaccines are Pfizer and Moderna.
