A message from Pastor Allman

On the morning of this writing, I attended a Webinar, personally in a room with other Tampa Conference Rostered Leaders, and virtually with Synod Staff and Rostered Leaders from around the Florida-Bahamas Synod. The presenter was Rev. Dr. Reggie McNeal, a renowned speaker and author, who was addressing ways to attract Kingdom Conspirators.

In the months ahead I will share more of his teachings about shifting to a Kingdom Centered focused, with the Council and with the congregation, although from this morning what stood out most notably was his observation that we need leaders who maintain optimism while facing reality. God is not looking for Pollyanna followers, with some pie-in-the-sky, rose-colored-glasses piety. God also calls us

to <u>not</u> be bogged down by pessimistic negativity.

Moses and the Prophets were called into service during times when hope was hard to come by: as was John the Baptist, Jesus, the Apostles, and Paul. In fact, I encourage each of you to search through the Bible stories and Church history to find people who answered God's call when circumstances were not dire. These are people that Dr. McNeal would call Kingdom Conspirators. They maintained optimism while facing reality.

Moses had no illusions when he confronted Pharoah. The Prophets had no illusions when they spoke the Word of God to people that did not want to hear it. John the Baptist had no illusions about the religious/political leaders when

he called people to a baptism of repentance. Jesus had illusions when he challenged those same political/religious Jerusalem. leaders in Apostles knew very well that they were putting their lives in jeopardy by preaching God's Gospel. Paul lists out tribulations in 1 Corinthians 11:23-27.

I have said before that if you think being a Christ-Follower is easy, then you are not doing it right. Yet, when we are doing it right, it is definitely worth it, because we become Kingdom Conspirators in God's Mission of Salvation. Rev. Richard Rohr reflects on the question, "What, then, does it mean to follow Jesus?" He answers, "History is continually with people graced somehow learned to act beyond and outside their self-interest

and for the good of the world, people who clearly operated by a power larger than their own. Consider Gandhi, Oskar Schindler, Martin Luther King Jr. Add to them Rosa Parks, Mother Teresa, Dorothy Day, Óscar Romero, César Chávez, and many unsung leaders. Their inspiring witness offers us strong evidence that the mind of Christ still inhabits the world."

If you are reading this, that means you are still in this world, and God still has a purpose for your life. How will you respond?

FEBRUARY STEWARDSHIP

"The Greatest Commandment: When the Pharisees heard that (Jesus) had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, an expert in the law, asked him a question to test him. "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets" (Matthew 22:34-40).

February, at least in the USA, is a month when there is a larger marketing focus on <u>love</u>, especially surrounding the 14th, commonly called St. Valentine's Day. Traditionally, people are expected to show their <u>love</u> through gifts of flowers, candy, greeting cards, and a romantic dinner. The flower is traditionally seen as the favorite of Venus, the Roman goddess of love.

In the UK there was a tradition of sending anonymous greeting cards and red roses as a gesture of romantic interest. In Wales one might instead celebrate St. Dwynwen's Day on January 25, when men traditionally gift women with hand-carved wooden spoons. In Japan, women give men honmeichoco, translated as "true feeling chocolate," on Valentine's Day; and, then on March 14th men give women white chocolate and other gifts. South Korea follows the same traditions as Japan; and, adds another holiday on April 14th in which single friends gather to eat noodles in a black sauce and celebrate being single. Finland and Estonia celebrate Friend's Day on February 14th, a day for honoring both friends and significant others. Cards and gifts are still given out, and can be for anyone from a best friend to a neighbor.

These forms of celebration depict love as an emotion, usually directed at only one person, which results in the giving of romantic gifts. Jesus uses love as a verb, in which the one who loves gives the gift of one's whole self – heart, soul, and mind – to God <u>and</u> to others. Jesus was not giving the Pharisees a new command. What Jesus said came from their Hebrew Bible, and a daily spoken prayer called the Shema. When we interpret Jesus' command with our Valentine's Day filter, we completely miss the message of God's Word.

The Apostle Paul describes love as a verb in 1 Corinthians 13: Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable; it keeps no record of wrongs; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends... faith, hope, and love remain, these three, and the greatest of these is love (Verses 4-8, 13).

Despite 1 Corinthians 13 becoming popular for weddings, Paul writes these words to all Christians as how to interact with the whole world, not just for married couples. Imagine what kind of world we might have, even if just Christians treated <u>love</u> as a verb expressed toward everyone, as Jesus named the two greatest commandments (Mt. 22:34-40), or even as Paul listed out in 1 Corinthians 13.



GROWING IN FAITH

What is a prophet? I would imagine most of us would immediately think of a white haired (or balding) older man, read about in what we call the Old Testament. Someone who stereotypically tells God's people what they do not want to hear, and subsequently finds themselves in trouble. Christians may also think about John the Baptist, whom some consider the greatest prophet as Jesus said, "...among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist..." (Mt. 11:11). A common misconception is that John the Baptist was the <u>last prophet</u>. Yet, God has not stopped sending prophets to God's people; even though God's people may still resist what a prophet has to say.

One theologian calls the prophetic path the *journey into the heart of God*. We likely are all familiar with what is called the great love chapter, 1 Corinthians 13; yet, I remind us that Paul's letters were not originally divided into chapters and verses. How many of us write letters that have chapters and verses? The very first verse of chapter 14 reads, "Pursue love and strive for the spiritual gifts and especially that you may prophesy" (IMHO, this verse belongs with chapter 13). Apparently, Paul considered prophesy to be the greatest of the spiritual gifts. So, what would make people today think prophets belong only in the ancient past?

Dr. Barbara Holmes says that Prophets are leaders, although not leaders of their own choosing. Inevitably, they have some sort of divine encounter. In bringing messages from God — and God does not mince words — God speaks directly through them. They have a relationship and intimacy with the Divine. They communicate with God through prayer, direct speech; God walks and talks with them. Maybe not literally yet in other ways.

Pastor Howard Thurman says that Prophets view God as actively involved in our lives, and asks each

of us to consider: How do you interpret the events of your life? How do you measure them? Do you live your life on the basis that all that there is to you and what you do is wrapped up in the... pulse beat of your individual life? Thurman continues that a prophetic point of view is that human life, as well as the lives of nations, takes place within a context that is dynamic.

Prophets help us move from a personal, individual world view (i.e., how everything that happens affects me personally), into a Kingdom of God world view. Prophets help us view the world from the Kingdom of God perspective, where God's people work toward communal well-being, which will ultimately result with individual well-being.


The words of the prophets, while making us feel defensive, stretch us to live our best lives. God calls us to pursue righteousness, not easiness; to sustain a drive toward excellence, not mediocrity; to strive for God's preferred future, not "what-will-be-will-be." The words of the prophets help us to see a better future, and then challenge us with what we have to change to get there. Think of all of the biblical characters that we think are great, and consider what would have happened if they told God, "No!"

Just think back to Bible readings over the last few weeks: What if Mary had said "no" to being the mother of Jesus? What if Joseph had said "no" to the angel and divorced Mary? What if the Magi had said "no" to the angel who told them to not tell Herod where Jesus was? What if John the Baptist had said "no" when God sent him to baptize Jesus? What if the disciples had said "no" when Jesus called them to follow him? What if Peter had said "no" when God sent him to baptize the Roman Centurion, Cornelius, and his household? What if Paul had said "no" when Jesus called him to take the gospel to the Gentile nations? What if you say "no" when God asks you to do something that will further God's Kingdom?






DID YOU KNOW?

These six popular foods can add high levels of sodium to your diet:



BREAD & ROLLS

Even though bread does not taste salty some brands can be high in sodium. Check the labels to find lower-sodium varieties.



CURED MEATS

One 2oz. serving, or 6 thin slices, of deli meat can contain as much as half of your daily recommended dietary sodium.



PIZZA

A slice of pizza with several toppings can contain more than half of your daily recommended dietary sodium. Limit the cheese and add more veggies to your next slice.



POULTRY

Sodium levels in poultry can vary based on preparation methods. For a healthier option cook your own chicken at home using fresh ingredients.



SOUP

Sodium in one cup of canned soup can include more than half of your daily recommended intake. Check the labels to find lower sodium varieties.



SANDWICHES

A meal from a fast food restaurant can contain more than 100% of your daily suggested dietary sodium. Try a half portion with a side salad instead.



Excess levels of sodium may place you at risk for: High Blood Pressure, Stroke, Heart Failure, Kidney Disease, Kidney stones, Osteoporosis, Headaches



Sensing the Gospel: A Five-Part Series for Lent by Matt Skinner,

Professor of New Testament, Luther Seminary St. Paul, MN.

We encounter God and God's salvation in embodied ways — in our bodies' abilities to perceive familiar realities and to interpret new ones. Lent provides opportunities to acknowledge this. The season begins with smelly and greasy ash as a stark liturgical reminder of our flesh's dusty finitude. It will end with feet washed in cool water or a bittersweet taste of wine in mouths as we imagine the horrible sight of a man's body mangled on a cross. In between, Lent allows us to consider together who we are and how we encounter an incarnate God.

Week One (Touch): March 1, 2023

Texts: Psalm 118:15-17; Revelation 21:1-4; and Luke 7:11-15

All the action in Luke 7 ceases when Jesus' hand contacts the bier carrying the son's corpse. Palpably, his touch injects life and renewal into desolate conditions.

Week Two (Sight): March 8, 2023

Texts: Psalm 36:1-2, 7-9; 1 Corinthians 13:12; and Mark 8:22-25

This unique healing story, which only Mark tells, symbolizes that Gospel's emphasis on mystery and delayed disclosure. It is also a story about a Jesus who never gives up on myopic disciples and who alleviates human suffering whenever it presents itself.

Week Three (Taste): March 15, 2023

Texts: Psalm 34:4-8; 1 Peter 2:2-3; and, John 2:1-10

Imagine the expression on the chief steward's face when he tastes the sample of Jesus' private reserve to determine whether it will be appropriate for consumption. Jesus' first miracle in John, changing water into wine, announces that Jesus' time indeed has begun, a time bursting with the flavors of fulfillment and abundance.

Week Four (Hearing): March 22, 2023

Texts: Psalm 62; Romans 10:14-17; John 5:25-29 Authority resides in the Son of God's voice because of its innate ability to accomplish what it says. When Jesus discusses judgment in John, he places more emphasis on life than on condemnation. His ministry reverberates with sounds that beckon people toward life and safety.

Week Five (Smell): March 29, 2023

Texts: Psalm 141:1-2; 2 Corinthians 2:14-16a; and, John 12:1-3

A pound of ointment, equal in value to a laborer's annual salary, spreads its aroma throughout the house. Some smells permeate everything. Our brains process scents in close proximity to our emotion and memory centers. God's grace may operate in similar ways.



Lifeline screening

On Monday, March 20th at Redeemer Lutheran Church Life Line Screening will be offering safe, painless, non-invasive preventive health screenings that do not require you to disrobe. These screenings are typically not a part of a routine physical. To be proactive about your health for yourself and your family, register for these health screenings today.

A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

- Carotid artery ultrasound to identify plaque buildup in the carotid arteries, a major risk factor for stroke. 80% of strokes are preventable, 75% have no warning signs!
- Abdominal aortic aneurysm ultrasound to identify presence of an enlargement in the largest blood vessel in the body.
- An EKG to identify the presence of atrial fibrillation, which increases the risk for stroke!
- Ultrasound of the lower legs to look for plaque buildup known as peripheral arterial disease.

These four screenings are offered for only \$149, take 60-90 minutes to complete and do not require you to disrobe.
