A Message from Pastor Allman

As I write this article, it is <u>hot!</u> We are experiencing triple digit heat indexes daily. Some parts of the country are under heat advisories. The news has carried stories of people dying from the heat. At the same time, the upper northeastern part of our country is flooding. Florida is well into our hurricane season, and thankfully we have not yet had any destructive experiences – still multiple home insurance companies have either stopped servicing Florida or announced that they soon will.

What is there to say about August, other than I doubt it will get cooler, and the threats of hurricanes will still exist? Hope motivates us to keep moving forward. Most school years begin again in August, although I know of one school that began in July. In July we have been seeking to help teachers and students by donating school supplies. AUGUST STEWARDSHIP

John Wesley (1703-1791) was an English cleric, theologian, and evangelist who was a leader of a revival movement within the Church of England known as Methodism. The societies he founded became the dominant form of the independent Methodist movement that continues to this day. In 1738 he had an intense religious experience. Moving across Great Britain and Ireland, he helped form and organize small Christian groups (societies) developed intensive and personal that accountability. discipleship. religious and instruction. Members met regularly for learning and personal accountability. The following questions were used by Wesley (and others) for selfexamination - and may be helpful as we consider ways in which our actions speak louder than words.



Am I consciously or unconsciously creating the impression that I am better than I really am? In other words, am I a hypocrite?

Am I honest in all my acts and words, or do I exaggerate?

Do I confidentially pass on to another what was told to me in confidence?

Can I be trusted?

Am I a slave to dress, friends, work, or habits?

Am I self-conscious, self-pitying, or self-justifying?

Did the Bible live in me today?

Do I give it time to speak to me every day?

Am I enjoying prayer?

When did I last speak to someone else about my faith?

Do I pray about the money I spend?

Do I get to bed on time and get up on time?

Do I disobey God in anything?

Do I insist upon doing something about which my conscience is uneasy?

Am I defeated in any part of my life?

Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy, or distrustful?

How do I spend my spare time?

Am I proud?

Do I thank God that I am not as other people, especially as the Pharisees who despised the Publican?

Is there anyone whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold a resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?

Do I grumble or complain constantly?

Is Christ real to me?

Feel free to post these in a conspicuous place and refer to them often.

GROWING IN FAITH

(Jesus said) "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven... For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet only your brothers and sisters, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the gentiles do the same? Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:43-48; NRSV).

These verses come from what we call Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, of which many reference only the Beatitudes (5:1-12), yet the sermon is all of chapters 5-7 of Matthew's Gospel. Jesus presents many of these type of statements in which Jesus is basically saying, "This is the way you think it should be, and this is the way God thinks it should be." Jesus and God set the Christian bar way higher than we do.

Yet, if the bar is set at, "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect," we are destined to fail, so why bother? I have a poster above my desk that reads, "The only way to discover the limits of the possible is to go beyond them into the impossible." Some might say that the best way to fail is to not even try. The Apostle Paul writes, "I press on toward the goal, toward the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14; NRSV). Some who can be blatantly honest might admit that they do not even want to try; it is too hard.

Rev. Richard Rohr, in one of his devotionals, considers this difficult teaching from Jesus to love our enemies. Rohr writes, "The understanding that I am a holy child of God contains within itself often unrealized consequences. If I embrace this notion about myself, I must accept its corollary: that is, if I am a holy child of God, then so is everyone else." Liza Rankow, author and interfaith minister, writes, "(Oneness) is even an easy thing to profess, until we

realize that it must include not only the people we like and agree with, not only those to whom we are sympathetic, but also those whom we view as abhorrent (whatever side of a political position we may hold). We don't get to choose who we are one with—it's everybody."

I sometimes quip that if you think being a Christian is easy then you are not doing it right. If you think I am kidding, then read Matthew, chapters 5-7, and keep reading them over and over until you understand. Jesus' admonition to love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you is only the tip of the proverbial iceberg.

The people that Jesus made friends with were the outcasts of religious society, the tax collectors, and sinners. Rev. Howard Thurman wrote, "Jesus, however, approaches life from the point of view of God. The serious problem for him had to be: Is the Roman a child of God? Is my enemy God's child? If he is, I must work upon myself until I am willing to bring him back into the family.... If God loves them. that binds me. Can it be that God does not know how terrible my enemy is? No, God knows them as well as he knows himself and much better than I know them... If a person is of infinite worth in the sight of God, whether they are saint or sinner, whether they are a good person or a bad person, evil or not, if that is true, then I am never relieved of my responsibility for trying to make contact with this worthy thing in them". (The Growing Edge (New York: Harper & Brothers, 1956), 17-18).

The easiest way to cultivate a new relationship is to walk up to and speak with someone on Sunday morning, someone you do not already know. And, you can open that conversation with, "Hi, my name is ______. I do not think I know you yet." You can do this before or after worship; which is also a great time to invite them to sit with you during fellowship afterward. Or, you could approach someone already enjoying fellowship time; especially if you see someone sitting by themselves. These are already brothers and/or sisters in Christ, so it is a great place to start. Once you grow in confidence, you can transfer that confidence to speak with someone outside of Redeemer, who Jesus would call "your neighbor."


School Supplies Thank you
