A Message from Pastor Allman

Independence Day. That is the big thing that Americans will be celebrating this month, in just a few days, on the 4th. What does it mean to be truly independent? Here are a few definitions: not subject to another's authority or jurisdiction; autonomous; free; not influenced by the thought or action of others; not dependent; or not depending or contingent upon something else for existence.

As I thought about those definitions, I realized that I cannot really claim to be truly independent. Ultimately and in every one of those categories I realize that I am completely dependent on God. God is responsible for my initial and continuing existence. God influences my thoughts and actions. I am under God's authority and jurisdiction. And, frankly, I do not want to be truly independent from God. I love God and I love being able to talk with God anytime and anywhere, and I love knowing that God loves me and loves hearing from me.

I suspect that some of you are thinking, "Well, Pastor that is not what Independence Day is all about." I realize that. Independence Day has nothing to do with religion and everything to do with politics and separation from the King of England. And, I realize that there were thirteen colonies,

numbering in the millions of people, who had to depend on one another to make the Declaration of Independence worth anything.

Either way, the point is the same: none of us are truly independent. Everyone falls under some kind of authority or jurisdiction. No individual can be truly autonomous. There is someone who influences your thoughts and actions. None of us can exist outside of community. My encouragement is that each us be aware of our choices and choose wisely.

JULY STEWARDSHIP

Which do you practice: a theology of abundance or a theology of scarcity?

Psalm 23:1 reads, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want." Matthew 6:25 reads, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear." Philippians 4:6 reads, "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God."

The economic situation of the world certainly shows the disparity between abundance and scarcity. The richest 1% in the USA now own more wealth than the bottom 90% combined. Oddly one statistic states that the rich – the ones with the abundance – rely on an ideology of scarcity, while the poor – the ones suffering from scarcity – rely on an ideology of abundance. (Example: read Mark 4:41-44, The Widow's Offering)

An ideology of scarcity says there is never enough, so hold onto what you have. In fact, do not just hold onto it, hoard it. Put aside more than you need, so that if you do need it, it will be there, even if others must do without. When I was young, I never thought about whether we were rich or poor, because there was always enough.



An affirmation of abundance says there is enough to go around, so long as each of us takes only what we need (i.e., "I shall not want" Psalm 23:1). In fact, if we are willing to have and not hoard, there will

even be more than enough left over. In the story of the feeding of the five thousand, after everyone has had enough to eat the disciples gather twelve baskets of leftovers.



Gifts, for which we are willing to give thanks and share, have immense potential. Walter Brueggemann writes, "(In the Gospel) Signs of unlimited generosity are abundant and visible, leaving no room for the mistaken notion of scarcity...We don't experience the world that way. But (the) Gospel suggests that this is because we, like the disciples, are not clear about the limitless generosity of God." (Enough is Enough, The Other Side, November-December 2001, Vol. 37, No. 5).

We are stuck between a world that teaches us to "look out for number one" and the Bible that teaches us to trust that God will provide enough for our personal needs and even more to share with others. The ideology/theology of scarcity is a false teaching, coming through the world, from the Father of Lies! When we gather for worship each Sunday it is to hear the good news that God is enough, and more than enough – abundance.

GROWING IN FAITH

"Now you are living stones that are being used to build a spiritual house" (1 Peter 2:5, CEV).



When I was the pastor in a multigenerational congregation, and had responsibilities for the youth, Sunday school and catechism programs, one of the comments heard most often was to wonder why the young people disappeared after making their Confirmation. Along with that, I even wondered why the people that stayed in the Church stopped their spiritual development after catechism training. By that I mean, why did most people who regularly came to worship not come to Sunday school and/or Bible study?

Often today I read or hear people talking about spiritual maturity and it makes me wonder, "What does 'spiritual maturity' look like?" The Apostle Peter (above) says that we are living stones being built into a spiritual house. The verse implies that there is a builder (God) and that we go through an ongoing building process.

In his letter to the Ephesians, Chapter 4, the Apostle Paul says, "I beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called" (Eph. 4:1, NRSV). And again, "Christ chose some of us to be apostles, prophets, missionaries, pastors, and teachers, so that his people would learn to serve and his body would grow strong. This will continue until we are united by our faith and by our understanding of the Son of God. Then we will be mature, just as Christ is, and we will be completely like him" (Eph. 4:11-13, CEV).

As I put those quotes into the proverbial "nutshell," the Apostle Paul is telling us that each one of us is

called by God, some are called to teach and some are called to grow in faith and to serve others, until we all become mature – which means "completely like Christ." So, you be your own judge, "Are you completely like Christ?" If the answer is "no," then I encourage you to find ways to learn to grow into spiritual maturity (Grow in Faith).



We have the Christ in Our Home daily devotional booklets on the Welcome Table, and the next quarter (July-September) is available. Whether you are an avid reader of this or looking to start, this is a great resource, as it often uses the upcoming Sunday readings during the week. You may want to read the Bible, yet want a different resource. You can search the internet and find a reading plan, possibly even to read through the Bible in one year. There are also "apps" that will read the Bible aloud for those who may want to do that while going on your daily walk. I have been offering an overview of the Acts of the Apostles on Thursday mornings via our You Tube channel (about 30 minutes), and there is no formal Bible training required to watch the videos. 
Older Adults and Posture

Static posture is our body alignment in standing. What do we know about standing straight?

Maintaining a good standing posture is important for good balance and ability to move. Bad posture and weak muscles can change our posture. Chronic pain is a significant cause of changes in standing posture.

Pain in hips, knees, and/or the spine are the most common places changing our postures. Hip or knee pain, typically from osteoarthritis, changes putting your weight equally on both legs. Injuries from many years ago can precipitate pain and result in postural change. Spine pain may be the result of previous surgeries, older adult scoliosis, spinal stenosis, or spinal osteoarthritis. Pain management physicians and/or physical therapy can help to reduce the pain. Daily awareness of static and dynamic postures and adapting your activities of daily living can offer some relief.

No one likes to stand in line, but many of us are unable to do so because of pain or fatigue. Several things may help. For example: Shifting weight from one leg to another, shifting weight from the front to the back of your feet, and taking some weight off your feet and on to your hands by using a cane or walker.



Good standing posture is when your ear lobe is over the middle of your shoulder, your hip joints, the middle of your knees, and over your foot just in front of the ankle.

One way to check your posture is to back up to the refrigerator and put the handle(s) against your spine, pulling shoulders back and lifting the top of your head as the arrow shows. Doing this frequently will help your body remember what good posture feels like.

General instructions are to pull shoulders back and pull in your stomach. However, I've found that pushing my belly button out will make my shoulders come back and my hip muscles work.

Good shoes with orthopedic support can make a difference in posture. Flip Flops or sandals without heel support do not support good posture.

Daily exercise is a key to keeping our posture the best it can be. It's a daily battle, but it is worth the effort.
